## Poetry



### Welcome young writers!

Your task this week is to have a go at writing your own poetry. There are two poems for you to have a go at.

#### Poem 1

This poem gets you thinking about the different types of word classifications. Pick a noun to write your poem about – this is your title and first line of your poem. The adjectives, verbs and adverbs that you then pick will all relate to the noun that you selected.

Here is the layout of the poem:

### <u>Noun</u>

Noun,

Adjective, adjective,

Verb, verb, verb,

Adverb, adverb, adverb, averb.

Use your CGP books to help you look for the definition of each word classification.

Remember some words can be put into more than one word classification, e.g. point is a noun and a verb. Verb = Point at the door. Noun = There is a point on the pencil.

#### **Success Criteria**

Try to include the following in poem 1:

Commas in between words		
Capital letter at the beginning of each line		
Full stop at the end of your poem

Adjective		
Verb		
Adverb		
Picture – draw a picture underneath your poem to illustrate it

# Challenge

Try not to repeat root words in your poem, e.g. playful, playing, playfully.

Your poem may sound too repetitive.

Can you use some new vocabulary?

Use a thesaurus to look for words that you could use.

### Poem 2

This poem uses the subjunctive mood/form. Use your CGP books to look at this and refresh yourselves with what the subjunctive mood is. You will also need to use your knowledge of the different word classifications that was looked at in poem 1.

### Layout of the poem

<u>If I were</u>
If I were a/an adjective, adjective noun,
I would verb
ing

(Use the example to help make sense of this)

It is completely up to you how many verses your poem has. Think about what animals or objects you'd like to be and why. Some examples might include a feather, an owl, a dolphin, an old key, a firefly or a raindrop.

Try to include the following in poem 2:
