Can you find a variety of ways to 'walk' the plank? Hop? Go backwards?



Mathematics:
Number

Children count reliably with numbers from one to 20, place them in order and say which number is one more or one less than a given number. Using quantities and objects, they add and subtract two single-digit numbers and count on or back to find the answer. They solve problems, including doubling, halving and sharing.

Using coins around the house, use a wax crayon and piece of paper to rub over the coin. How many ways can you make 5p using only 1p and 2p coins? What about 10p?





Mathematics:
Shape, Space
and Measure

Children use everyday language to talk about size, weight, capacity, position, distance, time and money to compare quantities and objects and to solve problems. They recognise, create and describe patterns. They explore characteristics of everyday objects and shapes and use mathematical language to describe them.

Can you create a pirate ship using 2D shapes?



Can you build a pirate ship using 3d shapes around the house? This can be as big or small as you would like it to be. Discuss all the shapes you see with an adult. Can you describe the shapes?



Sorting treasure- collect a variety of 'treasure' from around your house. These could be sweet wrappers, coins, pebbles, shells, gems etc. Can you sort your treasure into 3 different groups? It can be any way you want to.
