Staying Safe

Safety is important because some activities could be dangerous. Children learn to keep themselves safe. For example, when the 'Duck Whistle' sounds, pupils come straight back to Mrs Gosling and do 'Sticky Elbows', which makes sure all the children in the group are there. Children are told they can go anywhere that the teacher can see them and they can see the teacher.

If a fire is built, children can only go in the fire circle if the teacher invites them. Everybody shouts Hot! Hot! Hot! as a warning. Water is used a lot for the activities, eg washing hands or making rivers. However, it is also useful for putting out fires!

Amazing Activities

Forest School is a massive opportunity for people to go outdoors, have fun and explore the world of nature. One of the games played is called 21s. This is a game in which you hide from a 'seeker'. The hider cannot move from the spot they are in. The seeker has to find them. It is a fun way to explore the local area.

Pass the Pine Cone is a game where a pine cone is held in the hands of one player behind their back. The person who is 'on' has to guess who has got the cone.

Popcorn is a type of food you eat. It is really scrumptious and exciting. Cooking it is a chance to learn how to stay safe around fires and avoid burns.



<u>Learning for Life</u>

In conclusion, Forest School is fantastic for learning about nature. However, it is also about learning to work together and cooperate. It will probably be one of the best things children do in Year 4. They get outside, have fun and learn lots!


While we were showing the little ones how to work sensibly and safely in the area, we also had the chance to make new friendships, and to develop our conversational and instructional
