

Where did they live?






A limerick is a humorous form of poetry that rhymes and has five lines. Here are some of Eagles' limericks:

<u>International Day — Mexico</u>

Year 5 children have enjoyed learning about Mexico and in particular the 'Dia de los Muertos' which is a traditional Mexican festival that celebrates the yearly opportunity to reunite with and commemorate ancestors.

Year 6's Charity Time!


In November, Year 6 children sold poppies and poppy merchandise to all classes in Key Stage 2. The children handled money and calculated change, which enabled them to

Brilliant Bikeability!


In October, Year 6 completed Level 2



The Year 6 advanced sewing club meet on a Friday lunchtime and have been busy producing lots of lovely hearts.


The hearts are made from felt and are hand sewn together using the blanket stitch.
