
We have been able to watch as our own duck eggs have hatched in the incubator. We enjoyed holding them and watching them take their first swim.

Our Ancient Greek Olympics

During the summer term, we studied the history of sport in our topic and English lessons. We found out about the modern Olympics and wrote a report about some Olympians and Paralympians. They worshipped at the temple of Zeus before competing, and made a promise not to go to war during the games. 

This term, children in Miss Myatt's class have enjoyed their learning in English based on explanation texts. They have watched a variety of mini clips based on Wallace and Gromit's Cracking Contraptions and have used the features of an explanation text to explain how each one works.

How does the Shopper 13 work? (Written by Ewan Langlands, 4PM)

The Shopper 13 is a robot that gets items for you. This invention can go to the shops while you are still at home. A camera sits on top of the robot so the controller can see where it is going. A joystick controls the camera.

A basket is on the top of the Shopper 13 and it is used to carry the items. WARNING! The Shopper 13 cannot carry heavy items. The Shopper 13 has wheels and hands.
