


Nursery News


Traditional Tales



We revisited our learning on careful counting, repeating patterns, counting in groups, 2D and 3D shapes and their properties, positional and directional language, and much more!

We even learned a maths magic trick that we could show our grown ups at home!



As part of our Year 1 Design and Technology project, we have built bug hotels. We have looked in detail at stable structures and what is needed. We then designed and created our own bug hotels situated in our very own Acorn Wood, outside Miss Buchan's classroom.


Maths Day

We really enjoyed our Maths Day on Friday 7th February. We took part in lots of different Maths challenges. The children took part in 'shape and space' challenges and tried to beat their partner to build tangram and pentomino pictures. Our sponsored event was a number hunt. Some children also faced the 'triangle' challenges and investigated how many different shapes they could make using triangles and how many different triangles they could build from strips of different lengths. Some children revised their knowledge of 2D shapes and 3D shapes and played 'shape' games such as, 'What shape am I?' We had great fun! 
World Book Day


On World Book Day, we all came to school dressed as our favourite book characters and lots of fun was had! Throughout the day, we completed a range of




activities, explored a variety of texts and had plenty of opportunities to get our 'noses' stuck into some fantastic books. Mrs Darby and Miss Malpass challenged us to use a wordless book to develop our oracy skills. In Year 2, we used Window by Jeanine Baker which linked beautifully with our previous learning about environmental activist, Greta Thunberg and our English text, Greta and the Giants. Using this book, we were able to have a rich discussion that developed our ambitious vocabulary and creative imaginations. We created some excellent artwork of looking out of our own windows. Some children decided that they were going to live amongst the movies stars in Hollywood, whilst others thought about how transport will develop in years to come, such as by travelling by hot air balloons and even flying cars!











Year 3 News

For World Book Day, Year 3 children studied 'Flotsam' by David Wiesner. The theme this year was 'Read Your Way' and there was no better way of doing this than sharing a wordless picture book. The children told the story by identifying key events in the plot and recognising the setting and characters along the way. The book follows the journey of a camera on an underwater journey. The children used ambitious vocabulary to build super sentences and completed descriptions of the illustrations in the book.

In science in Year 3, we have been learning all about plants and how they grow, what they need to grow and different parts of the growing process. We have completed on investigation as shown here where we have learned about water transportation by using food colouring and cut flowers.

We have also begun to grow some plants, investigating what a flower needs to grow.






In the leopards class, we have investigated temperature by having two plants in the classroom and two outside.

In the Tigers class, we have investigated light by keeping two plants away from the sun and having two plants grown in the sun.

In the Lions class, we have investigated water by watering two plants and not watering the other two.

This will show us what conditions a plant needs to grow.



All children enjoyed learning about the importance of perspective when participating in a landscape painting lesson. Each pupil developed an understanding of background, middle-ground and foreground. Terminology such as, the horizon was defined by where the ground meets the sky. Media such as pencil and paint were used to create a masterpiece such as the painting seen below.


Sewing Club





Grease is the Word!




Year 5 also enjoyed visiting
