

Ethan Askill in Year 3 Leopards, wrote a fabulous explanation of the mummification process, relating to our history topic of Ancient Egypt.







## Year 4 News

### Year 4 and Kingsmead's Primary Liaison Programme

Over the summer term, Year 4 worked closely with Kingsmead as part of their Primary Liaison Programme. Year 4 visited Kingsmead for science sessions and for farm tours, and Kingsmead members of staff visited Five Ways to deliver handball sessions. These activities offered exciting and enriching experiences for Year 4 pupils that build key skills and knowledge across the curriculum, as well as giving pupils the opportunity to explore, experience and sample life at Kingsmead.

Each class had the opportunity to visit Kingsmead's farm. First stop was the reptile house, where they met and found out about giant African land snails, hissing cockroaches, a bearded dragon, geckos, and guinea pigs. The children then had a tour of the farm itself and saw goats, pigs, rabbits, chickens and sheep. They particularly enjoyed feeding and stroking the two sheep.

### Year 4 News

On a separate morning each class visited Kingsmead for a science 'Changes in Matter' practical lesson in one of the science labs. Miss Methuen, a science teacher at Kingsmead, revisited the children's learning about states of matter from the autumn term. The children made oobleck by mixing together cornflour and water. This strange substance can behave as a solid or a liquid depending on how much pressure you apply. When the children grabbed some in their hand, it formed a solid ball in their palms until they released the pressure. After that, the children were given four test tubes containing unknown clear liquids. They used pH paper test strips to discover whether each liquid was acid, alkaline or neutral.

Mr James, a Kingsmead PE teacher, visited Five Ways to deliver handball sessions to each class. The children learnt the skills of throwing, passing and shooting, and they used full sized handball goals provided by Kingsmead. They all thoroughly enjoyed this activity.

### Forest School



The children in Year 3 and Year 4 have been enjoying their Forest School sessions over the last term.

### Year 3

They have been learning new games such as little hedgehogs, you're only safe if... and the screaming game to enhance their listening skills, to build confidence and well-being and to develop their social skills whilst playing as part of a group.

Other activities that the children have chosen to do include: using their imagination to make clay woodland tree guardians using natural materials, making shelters for small creatures, using a small tarpaulin / camo net to build a shelter, using natural materials to create a piece of artwork of their own choice, searching for and identifying minibeasts and understanding how to handle them correctly and finally, using a pair of adult binoculars to spot birds.

The children have also learn't about the safety associated with fire and have used a fire steel to make a spark.



The children in Year 4 have been learning new games such as 21, Go find..., different versions of rock, paper, scissors and farmer, farmer. They have loved playing you're only safe if... and have quite often taken their turn to lead the game.

Other activities that the children have chosen to do include: using their imagination to make clay woodland tree guardians or small clay sculptures using natural materials, using old wooden picture frames as a basis for a piece of artwork using natural materials, using a range of tarpaulins / camo nets to build a shelter that quite often have different rooms, searching for and identifying minibeasts and understanding how to handle them correctly and finally, using a pair of adult binoculars and investigating the woodland environment by using a digital microscope to look at and take pictures of their finds.



The children have also learnt about the safety associated with fire and have used a fire steel to make a spark. They have also begun to work in pairs/groups to make their own small fires using a ball of cotton wool and small sticks. Year 4 have also been learning how to tie a reef knot and a timber hitch and how to use these when erecting shelters.



Throughout the sessions, all the children in both Year 3 and Year 4 have been learning how to respect not only the environment of 'our woodland' but also the importance of looking after the resources that they use. Some of the children have helped paint two old tables that will be used for a variety of activities during subsequent Forest School sessions.

Dylan also celebrated his birthday whilst at Laches Wood and received a memorable rendition of Happy Birthday around the campfire.




Well done to all our Laches Wood adventurers. We had a fantastic week with many challenges achieved and many fears faced!
